


# Library N


### **Book Buzz**

## 19th March, Year 10, York University, The Science Trail

This event is suitable for students wishing to study Science and Medicine at University. Students will participate in hands-on workshops in exciting areas of science which affect us every day. Students will discover what it's like to study science at a research-intensive university, experiencing teaching and learning first-hand in lab sessions, lectures, seminars, demonstrations and debates.

## 20th March, Year 9, York University, Medicine

This event is suitable for students wishing to study Science and Medicine at University. The Year 9 event is based around the treatment of a patient with Parkinson's disease. Students will develop their team working skills in problem-based learning and find out more about imagining techniques that are used in medicine to treat patients through an interactive modelling session.

## 27th March, Year 7, York University, A Medical Emergency

This event is suitable for students interested in studying Science and Medicine at University. The session will be based on an imaginary patient, Lucy, who has been in a road traffic accident and has been rushed to hospital. In this session, students work in teams to diagnose Lucy's symptoms and save her life.

# School Events

## **Remembrance Day**

On Friday 9th November the Nidderdale High school community came together to remember those who served in the Great War. This year we wanted to focus on our 287 local men from Pateley Bridge and recognize their efforts to create a better world for us today. Students and staff across the whole school produced tributes to mark the centenary of the ending of the First World War. Mr Hawkins and Miss Porter skilfully made 287 wooden crosses with students in DT lessons. Students then wrote the names of the 287 servicemen on these crosses in their History lessons. Our KS3 manager Mrs Wright led a team of keen craft club students to crochet 287 poppies for the individual crosses, with a little bit of help from the staff team. The Art department carefully produced 287 clay poppies with students from across school. Some of these poppies petals were scattered around the memorial as a lasting thought to those who fell in the First World War.

Mrs Cawley-Johnson directed a team of talented musicians and the Year 7 and 8 classes in a musical tribute of 'I Vow to the My Country', which was performed in front of the whole school community. In addition to this, Year 9 students performed war poetry they had created in their history lessons which showed the respect, the care and the impact learning about the First World War has had on them. The service of remembrance was led by our Senior students Hannah and Joe. They shared with our community their thoughts on why it matters that we remember wars and also the impact it has had on generations since. The service was closed by Thomas Howard in Year 8 who performed the Last Post on his trumpet perfectly. This occasion marked not only a school community coming together to respectfully remember such an important part of our history; but also a school community reflecting on our roles within society today and the difference we can make.








App, recommended by parents, called Family Link. It allows parents



the ability to set ground rules for their child's online activity. Parents can use their own devices to view and monitor their child's online activity ensuring they are keeping safe. They can also see screen time and can set time limits. Parents can lock devices and, at bedtimes, put the devices to sleep ensuring a good balance of use. The App also has a location device, as long as the phone is being carried on the person.

# Uniform & Equipmen

## **Uniform Expectations**

A reminder that students wishing to wear a skirt MUST wear the official school skirt with the 'N' logo. The skirt can be purchased from stockists: Rawcliffes or Smart Start.

For boys and girls, trousers must be tailored. Slim fit, skinny, jeggings and leggings are not permitted.

All students must wear proper school shoes—canvas shoes, trainers or boots are not acceptable.

Blazers and ties should be worn correctly to and from school and around the building at all times. Students will be permitted to remove their blazers in the classroom if they seek the teacher's permission.

The only jewellery permitted is one pair of small, plain studs or sleepers, worn one in each earlobe. Students are not allowed to wear nose studs or any other form of facial or body piercing.

If students do not arrive to school in correct uniform they will be sanctioned accordingly. Students will be supported to ensure they are wearing their uniform correctly at the start of each day. After this they will receive a sanction if uniform is incorrect.
