# Year 7 Outdoor Course – Bewts-y-Coed

At the beginning of May, over half of year 7 participated in a 4 day Outdoor Education residential to North Wales. There was an overwhelming buzz from both staff and students from the start until the end. We stayed at Towers Outdoor Education centre in the heart of Snowdonia National Park. We started the trip off by testing ourselves on the low ropes course followed by an evening walk. The next day all groups ascended a gorge in the local area and some groups were challenged to a Via Ferrata and tree climbing. Despite the weather, the next day all groups were challenged to climb a mountain – the 3000ft 'beast' Tryfan. Another group reached the top from inside the mountain using old mines. Again, after dinner students took part in orienteering or a walk to the local village finding their way through the forest. The last day the sun came out and we were finally able to see the beautiful views of the surrounding area. All groups went to the local lake which had stunning views where we were surrounded by mountains. Everyone had the opportunity to explore the lake in canoes and then complete different challenges in kayaks. Most students stayed dry until the very end when they enjoyed being the water to see who could make the biggest splash! A busy week that was full of positivity.

For some students the idea of being in another country was exciting but the opportunity to learn about themselves through activities in the outdoors was the most valuable experience. Staff and students commented on how well they all supported each other and the kindness that was shown in a 'looking out for each other' ethos which made it a really nice environment and overall fantastic trip.

Students gained feelings of achievement and of course feeling truly exhausted! An unforgettable experience and a successful trip for everyone with students already asking to go again. I would also like to take this opportunity to say thank you to all staff who supported the trip and made sure the students had a fantastic time.
