Headteacher's Introduction

Dear Parent / Carer

This week has flown by in a flurry of activity preparing to welcome small groups of Year 10 students back to school for some additional support for their home learning. I am sure that Year 10 parents are growing weary of our endless instructions to follow this link, watch that presentation and book that transport! I know there has been a lot of information, but I hope it has been useful in setting out how we intend to bring students back to school.

I know that many of you with children in younger year groups may be feeling frustrated and anxious about the fact that your children have not been invited back to school, especially if you have younger children returning to primary schools. As I know you appreciate, we absolutely must follow all Government guidance and the scientific view that bringing secondary age students back into school carries a higher level of risk than younger children. This is due to the fact that older children have more and wider social contacts, are more likely to see those contacts independently and have to travel longer distances to school. All of these factors contribute to a slightly increased risk of community transmission.

It is also worth sharing with you that many of our classrooms cannot hold more than 6 students with current social distancing rules and none of them can hold more than 10. So, in reality it would be very difficult for us to invite many more students back at this stage even if we were asked to. We will continue to do all that we can to provide meaningful remote learning for all students and await further guidance about when and how more students can return to school.

Updated handwashing advice From Department for Education

It is essential that everyone washes their hands more often, using soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Hand washing with soap employs mechanical action that loosens bacteria and viruses from the skin. rinsing them into the drain. Drying hands afterwards makes the skin less hospitable to the virus. Hand sanitiser can be effective if soap is not available or the situation makes using soap less feasible (i.e. when outside) but using hand sanitiser provides none of the virus-destroying friction that rubbing your hands together and rinsing with water provides.
