### Make Your Mark / Member of Youth **Parliament Results**

In total 20 schools and youth settings signed up from across North Yorkshire to take part in the national elections, hosted by the British Youth Council. 7 campaign themes were voted on for Make Your Mark, as decided upon by UK Youth Parliament. 9086 votes were counted and submitted from 11-18 year olds across the county, the biggest turn out we have ever experienced in North Yorkshire.

The top campaign themes for North Yorkshire were "Health and Wellbeing" and "Education and Learning"; these were also the top 2 topics that were voted for nationally by young people across the UK.

The newly elected Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs) for North Yorkshire, are Brando Naïm Halloum for West, Connor Fox for Central and Adria Beattie for East areas of the county. They are currently receiving induction training through the British Youth Council as they begin their 2-year council funded term. These candidates were shortlisted by members of the county's Youth Cabinet – a group of young people who represent all Youth Voice groups from across the county.

#### **Handball Success!**

The PE curriculum has developed in the past 5 years. We have introduced a number of new activities. These include handball, parkour, futsal, ultimate frisbee, stoolball, table tennis, volleyball and many more! We also ensure that all students have the opportunity to participate in new activities and more traditional activities in PE and in extracurricular PE.

On Wednesday 16th March, our year 10 boys became the North East and North Yorkshire under 15 boys handball champions in Gateshead.

We didn't make the best of starts in the competition, losing our first game against St Mary's Newcastle 6-2. St Mary's were able to expose our flat 6 defence. Playing with a 4-2 defence, our fortunes changed in the second game as we convincingly beat Oxclose Academy Sunderland 5-2. In a tense third game, Ponteland High School snatched a late goal to secure a 3-3 draw. We were tied on the same points as Oxclose Academy and sneaked through to the semi-finals via the head-to-head rule.

We played the winners of group I John Spence Community Academy North Shields in the semi-final. Due to defensive mishaps, John Spence were able to level the game late on to force extra time. During a tense extra time period, we were able to lead and control the game in extra time eventually winning 5-4. Due to defensive solidity, bravery and discipline we restricted them to backcourt shots which were easily blocked and saved by Ethan.

In the final, we met the impressive St Mary's again as they ran out I-0 winners in the other semi-final. Playing with a resolute and disciplined 4-2 defence and a 5-I fast, effective and patient attack, we led the final 2-0 courtesy of goals from Dylan and Dom. Dylan from the left wing and Dom from the right back position. Ollie and Lewis defended bravely in front of the flat 4 and Ollie was pivotal in keeping their star player at left back quiet. Lewis had a good chance on the counterattack to make it out of reach for St Mary's but narrowly missed. St Mary's right-wing player then exploited a gap in the flat 4 defence to make it a tense finale. Dom with the assistance of Brendan on the right wing managed to exploit a gap in the St Mary's defence to make it 3-I. St Mary's managed to get another one, however due to excellent teamwork, effort and putting their own body on the line, the boys had won the game. At the final whistle, raucous celebrations began and were short as the boys paid their respects to the opposition. They showed incredible resilience to beat St Mary's who had the psychological advantage having beaten us 6-2 in the opening game. We were crowned under 15 champions and move on to represent the North East and North Yorkshire in the national school's handball finals. Date TBC.

I wish I could give a better more detailed account of the group games and semi-final however the sheer elation and stress of the day had blurred my memory! I am immensely proud of the achievement and the way the boys conducted themselves on and off court. The students who represented us and the students who didn't take part have all embraced handball since its introduction to our PE curriculum in 2018. Isn't it incredible what you can achieve with an open mind, hard work, dedication and respect?

I am aiming to further develop handball in our school this year and next year. I hope to enter the under 13 and under 15 competition next year. If any students are interested, extracurricular handball takes place every Monday. In PE, year 7 students will participate in the introductory handball unit with years 8, 9 and 10 moving onto the next stage of handball learning next year.


#### **Election of Parent Governor**
